DIRECTOR'S NOTES



The Great Gatsby is a story of dreams and desire, illusion and delusion. It is the story of eccentric and mysterious millionaire Jay Gatsby, who will stop at nothing in the pursuit of the lost love of his youth, Daisy Buchanan. Since its original release in 1925, *The Great Gatsby* has become a classic synonymous with flapper dresses, popping corks, jazz music and never-ending parties. But dig deeper, and you see it is a story where dreams are beyond reach and many times, the characters, in their obsession, give up all too much to fulfil their desires. Thus, tragedy is tucked into what is often marketed as a romance.

In creating this 1949 radio show that portrays a story from the 1920s, I found we were often straddling two different yet surprisingly parallel time periods. Both were times post-war, when people were embracing their hopes and

desires to achieve great success. By the late 1940s, the elusive American Dream continued to push the boundaries of class, race and gender equality. Modern conveniences had become more commonplace, and despite the return of men from the war front, women had kept their place in the workforce. Thus, it felt paramount to have the female voice and Foley artists portrayed as strong characters with minds of their own.

It is well known that the soundscape of a movie or theatre production augments a rich visual experience. In the case of this show, the story simply cannot be told without the sounds created by our talented Foley artist; not to mention the more than 28 voices crafted by our six skilled actors.

There is a fine balance when directing a radio show to maintain the integrity of the genre and also have the actors "act out" the events of the story. One wants to provide the studio audience with something to watch while not distracting from the main story. Then comes the all-important skill of matching sound to dialogue. Directing this play often had me standing at the back of the rehearsal hall with my eyes closed, simply listening; listening to pearls dropping, drinks mixing, and trains chuffing along. You too may want to close your eyes and listen, as if you were sitting in your parlour next to the radio on a Saturday night.

The Great Gatsby, in both film and live theatre, is visually portrayed with opulent extravagance. I love the fact that a radio play allows you to strip away the visual trappings and focus on the depth of storytelling. If you watch carefully, you will notice the actors on stage have their own personal story they are sharing. I invite you into the world of Nick, Jay, Daisy, Tom, and even Myrtle. May their story act as a cautionary tale of blind ambition and the cost of longing.

Finally, I would like to thank my husband, Matt, for stepping in to save the day more times than I can count!

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

Since then, he's been known for his slick moves, quick quips, and a grin that could melt an icebox. When he's not crooning, cutting a rug, or stealing the scene, you can find him working as a nurse in various Calgary hospitals, looking after people with futuristic machines called "pacemakers." Lou Moan has been performing/making a first-class spectacle of herself since she was knee-high to a grasshopper. Her very first big-league role was 'Star' in her Elementary School's Nativity Play, where she lit up the joint so brightly she took a header right off the stage. After that little caper, she beat feet into folk groups, rock bands, and show choirs, before graduating to musical theatre and straight acting like a real pro. But Lou's no one-trick pony—no siree. With a nifty sideline in costume and props design, she still wasn't satisfied. So, she rolled up her sleeves, banged out a play, and delivered a 30-minute monologue that would've made a GI sit up straight. Thanks to the crackerjack direction of Sherene Seders, the whole shebang practically cleaned house at last year's Regional One Act Play Festival and even snagged her a shiny CAT nomination. She's tickled pink to not have to utter so much as a peep in this production.



Dick Nichols

In this, his debut with the Dewdney Players, Dick is delighted to be back on stage performing in *The Great Gatsby* after more than a decade away from the footlights. He's stepping into Klippenstein, George Wilson, and other roles, bringing his expressive voice and a touch of razzmatazz to the boards. A seasoned narrator and journalist, Dick has spent recent years editing magazines, penning newspaper columns, and narrating audiobooks. But the lure of the greasepaint and the camaraderie of the ensemble proved irresistible. This gig is the bee's knees—a swell chance to reconnect with audiences in person and to honour Fitzgerald's timeless tale with fresh energy. Dick tips his hat to the Dewdney Players for welcoming him into the fold, and he's jazzed to share the spotlight with artists who keep the joint jumping.



ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

Robin Pawlak

Robin has had a long and illustrious career in the theatre. His breakout performance came in 1911 when he starred as "Young Gentleman in Restaurant" in a production of *The Girl With Whooping Cough* in Toledo, Ohio, and then various roles throughout the 1910s, 20s, 30s and 40s, including a brief role as a prompter. In 1948, Robin transitioned from acting to directing, with WBFR New York as volunteer part-time assistant director of this very play. In the Big Apple, he visited a psychic cafe where a fortune teller foretold that he would die in 1961 only to be reborn as a baby in Canada. Robin, ever the dreamer, often likes to imagine what such a life might look like. Perhaps by, let's say 2025, he may have married a lovely woman, raised a few kids, perhaps even grandchildren. Perhaps he would have retired by now from, say teaching, for example. Perhaps having taught drama and English, in retirement he'd write a couple of children's novels. Maybe he and his wife would settle in a charming town close to the Rocky Mountains. And, what if there was a little theater company there that he could join and maybe volunteer as a part-time assistant director while also writing some plays of his own? Nah!



STAGE MANAGER/STAGE MANAGER

Matthew Payton

Here's the skinny, cats and kittens—Matthew's back in the Stage Manager's chair with the Dewdney Players, ready to keep this shindig running tighter than a drum. 


- Adriatic Sea: body of water separating the Italian Peninsula from the Balkan Peninsula
- "Ain't We Got Fun": a popular song published in 1921
- Armistice: agreement made by opposing sides in a war to stop fighting for a certain time
- Beaux: male suitors or boyfriends
- Bond man: Nick's profession trading bonds at Probity Trust
- Bootlegger: person who makes or sells alcoholic liquor illegally
- Charleston: a popular dance of the 1920s
- Chewing: a type of smokeless tobacco product
- Clippings: articles/photos from newspapers and magazines
- Coupé: a car with a fixed roof, two doors, and a sloping rear
- Crabbing: grumbling, typically about something petty
- Cricket bat: equipment used by batters in the sport of cricket
- East Egg: fictitious neighborhood on Long Island where people who were born rich live
- Elocution: the skill of clear and expressive speech
- Gin Rickey: cocktail made from gin/bourbon and lime juice
- "Gratulate me": to express joy or congratulations
- The Great War: World War I
- Holocaust: destruction or slaughter
- Hopalong Cassidy: cowboy hero of popular western series
- Jazz-a-ge: a period in the '20s/'30s where jazz music/dance styles rapidly gained nationwide popularity
- Kaiser Wilhelm: ruler of Germany from 1871-1918
- Meretricious: attractive in a flashy way
- Mint Julep: a cocktail with bourbon, sugar, water, ice and mint
- Montenegro: a country in Southeastern Europe
- 1919 World Series: notorious baseball series plagued by scandal for being fixed
- "Old Sport": term of endearment used to a friend
- Oculist / optometrist: an eye specialist who provides glasses
- Panic of the war: first widespread financial crisis in the U.S.
- Pennsylvania Station: New York City's main railroad station
- Pompadour: man's hairstyle combed into a high mound in front
- Probity Trust: the company where Nick works as a bond man
- Prohibition: law prohibiting the manufacture and sale of alcohol in the US between 1920 and 1933
- Punchbowl: an extinct volcano located in Honolulu, Hawaii
- Red Cross: organization that cares for the wounded, sick, and homeless during wartime
- Roadster: an open-top automobile with two seats
- Rum-runners: a person or ship bringing prohibited liquor across a border
- Sauterne: a sweet white wine produced in southwest France
- Seventh Infantry: active duty infantry division of the U.S. Army
- Speakeasy: an illicit establishment that sells alcoholic drinks
- Spectacles: eyeglasses
- Tea garden: a garden or open-air enclosure where tea is served
- Tennis shoes: canvas/leather shoes for tennis or casual wear
- Third Division: WWI infantry who saw service on the Western Front in France and Belgium
- Toilet (or toiletry) set: matching hairbrush, comb and mirror
- Transitory: not permanent
- Tribune: daily New York newspaper (1841-1966)
- Valley of Ashes: fictitious neighborhood of Queens, New York considered depressing and industrial
- Victoria: automobile with a folding top over the rear seat
- West Egg: fictitious neighborhood on Long Island where people who have recently become rich live
- World's Fair: a large international exhibition to showcase the achievements of nations
- Yellow Rolls-Royce: Gatsby's car, a 1922 model 40/50 HP, aka the Silver Ghost



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


